"The 21st Century funding is to supplement and add on to the things that are going on during the school day," said Crocker Elementary School 21st Century Site Coordinator Kim Bellio. All activities are connected to the standards that we teach throughout the school year, as well as activities that they just like to do."

Adeline, who said she was "really excited" to have her father attend, also enjoyed the process of creating her own lava lamp.

"I really like how the bubbles go in and out," she said. "I really like science."

Fourth-grader Shawn Siart had his mother, Monica, attend the dinner. The 9-year-old says he enjoyed making the lava lamp.

"I'm going to shake it around," said Shawn Siart, adding he's going to keep it in his room.

Adrianna Kwapien sat in on "Crazy 8s Math Club" with her second-grader, Caleb.

"I think Mrs. Bellio does a fantastic job," Kwapien said. "I love all the teachers, and I love all the creative things they do."

In the math club -- directed by first-grade teacher Celeste Kearns -- the students and parents played a Dreidel game.

"It was nice to have them here for this event because they really like the Dreidel game," Kearns said.
"We played it last week so we would be all practiced up. It's a Hanukkah game, and it's a good game for

the family."

Another big-hit activity was "Pet Pawsitive" where the children got to work with Luna the dog and community partner, Sara Carlisle. Luna followed commands and also did tricks for treats.

Third-grader Joseph Charron attended the event with his parents, Bryanna and Kyle. He loved "the tricks" while interacting with the rescue dog.

"The parents played and they were great," said the 23-year veteran teacher.

Bellio says she sees tremendous growth in the students who attend the after-school programs.

"Many of these fourth-graders have been in the program since second-graders," Bellio said. "We see physical growth, we see academic growth and we see emotional security and empowerment. We see the whole child growing and interacting positively in the school community, as well as beyond."

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
